



The City of Auburn Athletic Programs

The Athletic Division is responsible for organizing seasonal athletic programs. Several leagues including baseball, softball, basketball, soccer, flag and tackle football, and cheerleading are offered for different age groups. These leagues, under the direction of trained personnel, make ample use of our lighted fields and recreation center gymnasiums.

The Samford Avenue Tennis Center offers lessons, league play and tournaments year-round. The courts are in excellent shape and were resurfaced in 2003. Information about classes and tournaments can be found in the quarterly brochure.

The Auburn Softball Complex is recognized as one of the premier softball complexes in the nation. The complex hosts Auburn's league and tournament play. In the center of the five regulation fields sits the control tower which houses concession stands, restrooms, meeting rooms, and a third floor press box. Nearby picnic area and playground equipment help turn softball games into an enjoyable outing for the entire family.

Duck Samford Park is recognized as one of the most prestigious baseball complexes in the nation. The complex was host to the 2002 Dixie Youth Majors State Tournament and hosted the 2005 Dixie Youth World Series. The complex also hosts several local and regional tournaments throughout the year. Duck Samford has 10-lighted playing fields with a picnic pavilion, children's facilities, 3 concession stands, restrooms, and hiking trails that connect the fields. Duck Samford has a two state of the art press boxes lo-


cated in the center of 4-lighted playing fields and 3 –lighted playing fields, as well as batting cages, and bull pens. The two children's playground facilities make the complex a desirable place for boys and girls of all ages. Phase II of Duck Samford Park was completed in July 2005. No doubt, Duck Samford Baseball Complex is where the entire Auburn community gathers to enjoy a fun day at the ballpark!

The Auburn Soccer complex is one of the newest additions to the Auburn Community. The complex serves as the new home for the Auburn Soccer Association. Phase I of the project includes six full-sized fields with light-

ing, one unlit practice field and a paved parking lot. There is also a state-of-the-art concessions building which provides office space, meeting space and restroom facilities. A lake compliments the facility. All of the Auburn Soccer Association Teams play their games at the complex.



Auburn's most recognized, and largest park, is beautiful Kiesel Park. The 157-acre dog friendly park is known for its horticultural beauty, colorful nature trails, and the historical Nunn Winston House. The park hosts parties, picnics, family reunions and spectacular weddings year round. The Nunn Winston House and entertainment pavilion make Kiesel Park a desirable place for a large or small gathering. The well-known park is also home to Auburn CityFest, Auburn's largest FREE outdoor festival, held on the last Saturday in April. The annual event attracts more than 35,000 people to beautiful Kiesel Park each year.

Although Kiesel is the largest park in Auburn, it's not the only park in our community. The City of Auburn has more than 10 city parks including: Hickory Dickory Park, Sam Harris Park, Martin Luther King Park, Felton Little Park, Bowden Park, Graham McTeer Park, Moore's Mill Park, Duck Samford Park and Town Creek Park. If you are interested in planning an outing, all parks are open from sunup to sundown for your enjoyment. Whether you're in the mood for a peaceful place for relaxation or a bustling playground full of activity, Auburn's parks are here for your leisure. So come play in our parks! For large gatherings, most parks are available for reservation on a first-come basis. Price and guideline information is available at the Dean Road Recreation Center.

The Auburn Parks & Recreation Department maintains the Dean Road and Frank Brown Recreation Centers and Boykin Community Center. The Frank Brown Recreation Center features a game room, gymnasium, kitchen and racquetball courts. The Dean Road Recreation Center houses the administrative staff and the Ceramics Shop. It also features a gymnasium, meeting rooms and a kitchen. Both recreation centers offer rooms for reunions, private parties, meetings and other events at very reasonable rates. Boykin Community Center houses a gymnasium and the Boys and Girls Club, and the center offers a variety of programs. Boykin Community Center is currently in the process of going through a renovation project.
